Grand River Waterway Dredging Potential Impacts to Protected Species

Waterways within Ottawa County, primarily the Grand River and its tributaries and banks, are home to many species of State-protected plants, birds, amphibians, reptiles, fish, and especially shellfish (clams & mussels) species. Disruption of the river substrate, flow channels, spawning grounds, banks, and riverine wetlands poses a significant threat to their habitats.

The following species of concern associated with the river corridor have been recorded to occur in Ottawa County:

The Natural Heritage Database tracks and records rare Michigan plants and animals that meet federal and state definitions of endangered or threatened species, as well as species of special concern. The list is maintained by the Michigan Natural Features Inventory, MSU Extension. This list includes all species within Ottawa County which may be associated with the river corridor.

<u>Definitions</u>:

- -"Endangered" indicates the species is in danger of extinction throughout all or a significant portion of its range.
- -"Threatened" indicates the species is likely to become endangered within the foreseeable future.

- -"Special Concern" indicates declining or relict species in the state which are tracked due to concerns for their future status. These species need protection to prevent them from becoming Threatened or Endangered.
- "Extirpated" are presumed to no longer exist in this state.

Legal Protection:

- The Endangered Species Act of the State of Michigan (Part 365 of Public Act 451, 1994, known as the Michigan Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act) states "a person shall not take, possess, transport, import, export, process, sell, offer for sale, buy, or offer to buy, and a common or contract carrier shall not transport or receive for shipment, any species of fish, plants, or wildlife" appearing on the State list of protected species. "Take" means, in reference to fish and wildlife, to harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, capture, collect, or attempt to engage in any such conduct. "Take" means, in reference to plants, to collect, pick, cut, dig up, or destroy in any manner.
- In addition, certain amphibians and reptiles are afforded additional protection by the Michigan Dept. of Natural Resources Director's Order No. FO-224-13. "It shall be unlawful to kill, take, trap, possess, buy, sell, offer to buy or sell, barter, or attempt to take, trap, possess or barter any reptile or amphibian from the wild, or the eggs of any reptile or amphibian from the wild, except as provided within this Order."

Federally Listed Species:

- If we broaden the list to Kent County, we add many other species, but most notably the Federally Endangered snuffbox mussel and scaleshell mussel (both also listed as State-Endangered), the Federally Threatened northern long-eared bat (State Special Concern), and the Federally Threatened eastern massasauga rattlesnake (State Special Concern).
